Proposed RNARS CONSTITUTION 2014

1. NAME

The organisation shall be known as the Royal Naval Amateur Radio Society, hereinafter referred to as the 'Society'.

2. AIMS

The aims of the Society shall be to:

- a) promote and foster Amateur Radio activities within the Service
- b) stimulate an interest in Amateur Radio as a hobby for all serving or past members of the Royal Navy, Royal Marines and the Merchant Navy.

- c) promote the RNARS to the Amateur Radio community
- d) assist Amateur Radio groups and individuals to establish special event stations in support of Society activities.
- e) liaise with Amateur Radio groups and individuals who wish to be associated with the Society.

3. MEMBERSHIP

Membership shall be open, subject to the discretion of the Committee, to all persons and Amateur Radio groups and including Short Wave Listeners with a maritime interest who wish to foster the aims of the Society particularly those who have served or are serving in:

Royal Navy

Women's Royal Naval Service
Royal Naval Auxiliary Service
Sea Cadet Corps
Commonwealth & other Navies
MOD in a civilian capacity

Royal Marines
Royal Naval Reserve
Merchant Service
Nautical Training Corps
RNLI & Coastguards

The grades of membership are:

- a) Full Individual Members, who may be current Amateur Radio licence holders
- b) Associate Individual Members, who need not hold a current Amateur Radio licence.
- c) Life Membership open to members who have completed 30 years membership and on payment of a lump sum of five years subscription at the highest rate payable at the time of application.
- d) Group Members incorporated Amateur Radio groups.
- e) Family membership is available where each member in the family group is domiciled at the same postal address.
- f) Affiliated Clubs or Societies Any amateur radio club or society whose members have a maritime interest.
- g) Honorary Membership may be granted to any person, who, in the opinion of the Committee, has rendered outstanding service to the Society either directly or indirectly.

All members shall abide by the constitution of the Society.

The Committee shall have power to expel any member whose conduct, in the opinion of at least three-quarters of the full Committee, renders that person unfit to be a member of the Society.

No Member shall be expelled without first having been given an opportunity to appear before the Committee.

4. SUBSCRIPTIONS

- a) The annual subscriptions for membership shall be set by the Committee.
- b) The financial year shall run from 1st April to 31st March.
- c) All subscriptions shall be due and payable at the beginning of the financial year. Members in arrears will have no voting rights.
- d) A member shall be deemed to have resigned from the Society, if, their subscription has not been received by the RNARS within three months of the Society's financial year-end.
- e) The Committee shall have the power to waive or reduce subscriptions in special circumstances for a period not exceeding 1 year at a time.
- f) Any overpayment of subscriptions is non-refundable.

5. FINANCE

- a) All money received by the Society shall be promptly deposited in the Society's bank account.
- b) Withdrawals of RNARS funds will require the signature of the Society's Treasurer and one other nominated officer of the Society's Committee.

6. MEMBERSHIP OF THE SOCIETY'S COMMITTEE

- a) The Society's affairs shall be administered by a Committee elected at the Annual General Meeting.
- b) Only Full and Life Members may hold a seat on the Committee.
- c) No member shall hold a seat on the Committee for more than two years without re-election.

- d) The Committee, in whom the Society's property shall be vested, shall consist of five officers, plus up to five Ordinary Members.
- e) The officers of the committee shall consist of:

A Chairman, who will preside at all meetings at which he is present.

A Vice-Chairman, who will act as chairman in the absence of the Chairman

A Secretary, responsible for keeping the minutes of all meetings of the Society, ensuring that all correspondence is correctly handled.

A Membership Secretary, responsible for maintaining a master roll of members and honorary members.

A Treasurer, who will be responsible for:

Keeping the Society's accounts.

Advising the Committee on all financial matters.

Preparing the accounts for audit and presenting them at the AGM.

They will also be supported by:

A Station Manager, responsible for maintaining a register of Society equipment.

A Web Master who will be responsible for the upkeep of the Society's web site

A Publicity Manager who will be responsible for issuing press releases to the Amateur Radio, national and local media and providing the Web Master with content for the web site.

A Data Communications Manager

A Newsletter Editor

A Commodities Manager who is responsible for acquiring approved commodities for sale

An Ex-officio appointed by the establishment in which the Society is based.

7. COMMITTEE STANDING ORDERS

The Committee shall function in the following manner:

a) Committee meetings may be called by the Chairman, or a quorum of the Committee.

- b) The quorum for any Committee meeting shall be a minimum of five full members.
- c) In the absence of a quorum, business may be dealt with but any decisions taken only become valid after ratification at the next Committee meeting at which a quorum exists.
- e) Committee meetings may take place either in a physical geographic location, or a virtual location over the Internet due to the likely dispersed nature of the Society's Committee.

8. ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Annual General Meeting, hereinafter referred to as the 'AGM', shall be conducted in the following manner:

- a) The AGM shall normally be held on the second Saturday of October each year.
- b) All correspondence to members regarding the AGM shall be promulgated in the Society's newsletter, e-mailed to members, who have provided the Society with an e-mail address, and mailed through the postal service to those without an e-mail address.
- c) A minimum of 21 days notice shall be given to each member in the Society's newsletter, in writing electronically or by post as appropriate.
- d) The quorum for the meeting shall be a minimum of 20% of the voting members in attendance at the AGM. Proxy votes from voting members for specific items shall be included in the quorum for those items.
- e) The agenda for the meeting shall be:

Newsletter Editor's report

Data Communications Manager's report

Election of new Committee Election of auditors

Notes: The first nine actions and reports shall be chaired by the out-going Chairman; Election of new Committee will be conducted by an acting Chairman who is not standing for election to the Committee and the remaining business by the newly elected Chairman.

- f) Nominations for Committee members will only be valid if proposed and seconded by other members of the Society in writing electronically or by post in due time before the meeting or proposed and seconded at the meeting.
- g) Items to be raised by members under other business must be notified to the Secretary a minimum of 21 days before the AGM.
- h) A full agenda, including items to be raised by members, will be distributed to members no less than 7 days before the AGM.

9. EXTRAORDINARY GENERAL MEETING

Extraordinary General Meetings, hereinafter referred to as an EGM, may be called by the Committee, or, by not less than twenty full members of the Society in writing to the Secretary.

- a) All correspondence to members regarding the EGM shall be sent direct to members electronically or by post as appropriate.
- b) The date of the EGM shall be the earliest convenient date as decided by the Committee.
- c) A minimum of 28 days' notice shall be given to each member electronically or by post as appropriate.
- d) No other business may be transacted at the EGM other than that for which the meeting was called.
- e) The quorum for the EGM shall be a minimum of 20% of the voting members of the Society.

10. AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

a) The constitution may be amended only at an EGM called for that purpose.

b) Where an EGM is to coincide with the AGM, the business of the EGM shall be conducted after the AGM.

11. WINDING UP OF THE SOCIETY OR MERGING WITH OTHER ORGANISATION(S)

- a) The decision to wind up the Society or to merge with other organisation(s) may be taken only at an EGM.
- b) The funds of the Society shall, after the sale of all assets and the payment of all outstanding debts, be disposed of as a donation to an established and recognised Charity or charities or to the organisation(s) with which the Society is to merge and will be decided by the Society at the final EGM.

DLØMFH - MV CAP SAN DIEGO

Our friends in MF Runde have their own flag ship, not a historic warship, but a real ocean greyhound; MV Cap San Diego, see the front page picture in the last Newsletter.

Following Doug's narrative in the last Newsletter, Hans-Juergen Kempe supplied me with information about the ship. She was in revenue service from 1962 until 1987 and was typical of the fast cargo (reefer) and passenger liners that plied the oceans in the 10,000 GRT range until container ships and bulkers took over world trade.

MV Cap San Diego is now berthed in Hamburg, however, she is by no means a static exhibit, a few times each year she slips her berth for a short cruise with visitors aboard under her own power with her original MAN engines, a testament to the build quality. Her classic sleek almost yacht like appearance was regularly seen on routes between Europe and South America.

MV Cap San Diego is propelled by a two-stroke MAN diesel engine with 9 cylinders and an output of 11,600 horsepower. During trials she reached a very credibal speed of 20.3 knots at 118 revolutions.



The ship is open to the public from 10:00 to 18:00 daily, and during the weekend the radio shack springs to life when MF Runde members operate the club station. The group have a web site (below) with details of sked times. RNARS members will be warmly welcomed and are advised to get in contact with Hans Juergen DK9OS (dk9os@gmx.de) or Harald DL5XI prior to visiting.

So, if you are planning to visit Hamburg, why not go aboard one of the last real cargo ship greyhounds and visit the MF Runde shack.

Pussers Kye recipe from Chief Kye Maker Doug GØLDJ

Ingredients to make sufficient for the bridge team during the middle watch:

One very large bar of Pussers dark chocolate One bag of sugar Ten tins of sweetened evaporated milk Water to fill fanny

Equipment:

Large fanny Rusty Pussers' dirk Access to a steam ship boiler room

Method:

Using the rusty dirk (adds additional flavour), flake the bar of chocolate and mix with sugar. Place into a large fanny with water and sweetened evaporated milk. After gaining permission to enter boiler room, place exhaust steam drain nozzle into the mixture, turn on the steam, heat and stir until the mixture takes on the appearance of road tar.

An ideal accompaniment is hard tack biscuits. In the absence of a steam boiler, and for individual consumption, a microwave may be substituted.

Captain's Table

It was while researching the records on a particular court martial of interest to me, I recalled one of the few occasions I stood as a rating's divisional officer during a captain's table.

The rating concerned was a stoker and noted boxer having started in the sport as a young lad and climbed the amateur ranks winning several regional and UK awards before joining the service, and until this incident had a completely clean record. During a run ashore in Dunfermline, Stoker X had been cornered by a couple of Royals from another ship and a difference of opinions escalated into a very short fist fight. By all accounts, the young stoker made a very good account of himself according to the report from officers from Fife Constabulary, one marine requiring hospital treatment for a split lip and broken nose.

Clearly to avoid embarrassment, the marines weren't keen to have the matter taken any further, but as the police had been called and one of the afore mentioned marines required treatment the police returned the stoker to his ship.

A Captain's table was convened the next morning and the young articulate stoker intimated to me he'd plead guilty and speak on his own behalf in mitigation. And so he pled guilty to the offences at the first opportunity and then proceeded to make a statement in mitigation when went along the following lines:

"I was avoiding alcohol in view of my training regime for a forthcoming boxing match between the Navy and the Army; hence I was sober and not looking for a fight when I went ashore to phone my mum from a phone in a pub. In the pub I was approached by two marines from another ship who started to discredit the good name of my ship and captain. I had no intention of getting involved with them so left the pub and was followed outside and again challenged about my ship and the reputation of my captain when one of the marines threw a punch which I blocked. In order to physically defend myself, ship and the good name of my Captain, I felt I had no alternative than to resort to the very minim of force required, which I did at all times only landing a couple of punches".

Although the stoker had pled guilty, the Captain really had no choice in view of the claim in mitigation to have up-held his captain's good name but to admonished the stoker and wished him well in the scheduled contest with the army.



One of the positive aspects of editing the Newsletter are the appreciative members who get in touch, here's one I received with some info on rigging a G5RV in a small space.

Thank you for the latest newsletter Colin; a very interesting read.

Just about picked you out of the noise this afternoon on 7.088 MHz. I would be very interested to be privy to the type of aerial you used on 40m today? (My comments below)

My set up is a homebrew G5RV centre at approx. eighteen feet secured to old TV bracket on sidewall of house, side wall faces south. One leg hung over end of gutter at rear of house then diagonally across backyard to old dinghy mast then down to back wall and secured with string to a nail. Height at end of leg; about five feet. The other leg, draped over end of gutter at front of house, then diagonally down to a post fitted with bracket for bird feeder in front garden, remaining length spirally wound on post until nothing hangs and secured with a couple of half hitches. The 300Ω feeder is thirty-two feet procured from TV shop for 50p for a length about sixty feet. It comes in via a window at rear of house at ground floor level in dining area. It is spliced via chocolate block onto very short length of RG58 into the MFJ deluxe versa tuner. Rig located on computer table very close to window. The aerial wire is the Mil Spec Kevlar, insulated and coloured green, very light to handle and blends in well with the greenery of the trees and grass.

My radio is an IC718 - 85W which seems to work reasonably well on 80 - 40 - 20 and on up with the exception of 21.410 MHz, it doesn't like the frequency and shows very high VSWR, beyond that 24 and 30 MHz, very happy!

I've attached a picture taken on 2^{nd} January 2014 whilst operating portable from Penn Common near Bramshaw Hants. It's within the bounds of the New Forest; the conditions were very cold with a gusty wind.

The radio I use in the field is a FT817 running five watts into my 5/8 vertical aerial. The wire is spirally wound onto a ten meter fishing pole and supported



by a surveyors tripod well anchored into the very soggy ground. Recently on 21.41 MHz SSB I worked Bill/WA1HMW - Peter/HZ1PS and Bob/N4XAT. Bob heard me 5-9 + 10 dB

Thanks for the e-mail and picture Doug, good to hear from you. The aerial I use at home was designed by RNARS member PWand columnist Carl Mason



(GWØVSW) who like me had to consider erecting an aerial in the attic due to lack of garden space.

Carl's "Crown Loop" aerial, is fed via a 4:1 balun, my version covers bands from 7 - 28 MHz. So far I've got through a kilo-watt scrum and worked Cuba, Bahrain as well as the West Coast of the USA. The radio's I use include an ICOM-706, SG20-20 and a home brew transmitter for eighty and forty.

Another letter I recently received came from **Doctor Ken Lown** (G4PTE – RNARS 2008) who now resides in a home run by the British Legion and sadly no longer has facilities for any form of radio operation other than as a SWL, and then only when the weather is suitable to sit outside in the garden with a portable receiver.

Ken has had a most interesting life from service in the Fleet Air Arm through to running a single handed GP medical practice and as a RNLI medical officer on the Margate lifeboat. Ken's most recent epistle to me highlighted one episode in his role with the RNLI.



A call came from the Coastguard to the RNLI requesting medical assistance for a crewman with bleeding varicose veins aboard a merchant vessel around lunchtime on a Friday. The local chemist was closed, however Ken managed to find the pharmacist and acquire three very large packs of cotton wool to take with him.

Arriving at the RNLI slipway, the boat was launched and within ten minutes Ken had clambered up the pilot ladder and was heading to the patient's cabin expecting to find a large pool of blood on the cabin deck. What he did find was the poor fellow in his bunk writhing in agony. Ken quickly diagnosed a kidney stone. After treating the patient, Ken wondered how the message had got mixed up.

It transpired that the Dutch Captain's English was difficult to understand over the radio. The Coastguard therefore asked the Captain to send his message from the standard maritime code book. The code uses three letter groups covering just about all eventualities; medical codes beginning with the letter "M". The Captain must have misread the code book and sent something like "MBD – VEINS" in place of the correct code for lower abdominal pain; "MBZ"; just one letter of difference between the two.

It was after re-boarding the lifeboat and on the run back to the harbour and mussing about the code mix up, Ken realised he'd left all the hard sought cotton wool aboard the ship.

These are the only committee members who can now sign in RNARS members or visitors wishing to visit the shack who do not have a pass into HMS Collingwood.

Joe G3ZDF had arranged with OFCOM for the issue of a special events station licence with the call sign GB6COD. Joe ran the PSK31 station and also kept the RNARS membership up dated via the internet with the frequency HF SSB/CW operators were using. Mick G3LIK was on CW first, but had to go home as he became very ill. Al Terry G4PZV took over and operated SSB on various bands throughout the day. Unfortunately for Terry, the QRN interference on the HF bands was very high this year from the attractions and events going on around the area of the club. This made it almost impossible to be able to have a worthwhile QSO. Terry did struggle with trying to make SSB contacts. Joe G3ZDF was also having problems on PSK31. He found that his PSK set up kept going into transmit mode and locking on even with the receiver input switched off. Ferrite filtering was tried on the

individual input leads. Unfortunately this did not cure the problem. Even changing over the antenna from the G5RV to the beam did not cure the problem. Phil G1LKJ was in the driving seat in the Skype and Echo-link bay. Phil was able to have a few contacts on Echo-link. Towards the end of the day as the activities and displays for the public to see and be involved in drew to a close, the QRN subsided. I went back on the HF radio and was able to make a few CW contacts just before we had to close down.

The RNARS club in HMS Collingwood hosts the Amateur Television Repeater GB3IV. This repeater allows amateurs to relay live television pictures along the south coast and sometimes over the channel to France when propagation allows. Here in the club we have a thriving ATV group. Peter G3PYP and his stalwart band of ATV enthusiasts were very involved in setting up cameras to monitor the main car park which had the Helicopters and numerous display tents. The ATV group had mobile camera crews walking round the site relaying pictures of the various activities going on back to the club room. The video was then streamed round the world via the internet. The group received reports back via the internet from as far away as Australia. The ATV group members deserve to be congratulated for once again doing a superior job.



One patch of seawater looks like any other. They are all lumpy, constantly moving, grey, green, or blue, cold, and very wet.

Chapter one. Somewhere in the Med.

The Action Information (AI) speaker, secure behind its metal grille on the console in between us clicked, then issued a tinny voice;-

"Guns? Captain. Are you ready?"

"Ready, Sir. We're waiting for Radar, over."

"Roger, ah, - Radar?"

"One moment, Sir, just double-checking." There was a short pause. "No surface targets within thirty miles. One aircraft track three miles South, heading West at two hundred knots, will be abeam in about one minute, Sir."

"Thank you. Guns. Do you have visual confirmation that you are tracking the drogue, and not the tug? Over"

"Nothing visible to Starboard!" A lookout called,

"Except the target."

"Guns confirms."

"Shoot!"

BOOM! One of the two 4.5 inch guns in the turret forward of the bridge, spoke, spitting its shell skywards. BOOM! BOOM! Each barrel fired one round each second, alternately, making the hull of Her Majesty's Leander Class Frigate Minerva buck and lurch with the recoil.

I rescued my cup of coffee as it danced precariously towards the edge of the console at which I sat, gazing disinterestedly at the four inch diameter green cathode ray 'scope in front of me in the dimly lit steel box of a room. This part of the NATO exercise didn't involve us, in the Electronic

Warfare department. As a result, most of the lads had their heads down, in the Mess, catching up on their much overdue sleep, as we had been at 'war' for a fortnight. The four on, four off, watch rota is a gruelling way of living, as during your four off, you are supposed to keep yourself and your kit clean, and perform all the necessary bodily functions such as eating and eliminating, as well as sleeping. Added to that, during daylight hours, the off-watch is required to be available for cleaning duties in their 'department'. This involves scrubbing the bulkheads, (walls), the deck, (floor), deck-head, (ceiling), and generally keeping the place clean and tidy. Unofficially, the time between eight am and noon was considered to be daylight, and the time between noon and four pm was night, thus allowing a bit of extra sleeping time, and four hours daily for cleaning and maintenance.

Because we weren't involved in this bit of the war, we didn't need the full crew in the Electronic Warfare Office, or EWO, so we had drawn straws to decide which of the half of the watch should be 'sent down' and allowed an extra four hours off. Guess who was unlucky. Still, next time, it would be our turn, while the other half tried to stay awake.

Terry 2 looked up from his tattered copy of Playboy.

"Noisy buggers!"

"Don't complain! The more they fire off, the less we'll have to lug back up from the bowels, and off-load before we can go on leave when we get back to Guz." (Guz is slang for Devonport.)

"Oh."

"Bloody heavy, they are, and plastered with thick grease. It takes ages to get it out of your eights, after!" (Eights, number eights, are the heavy blue cotton shirt and trousers worn as daily working clothing. All clothing is identified by numbers.).

"Oh." Terry was more interested in the centre-fold girl. "You want to try to nick a couple of empty shells, they make good fireside ornaments, with a bit of polishing!" "I haven't got a fire. Central heating."

"Posh git! Put your brolly in them, then!"

"I don't use one."

I gave up, and let him drool over the porno. There was nothing on the CRT except the fuzz of noise around the centre spot. As I was holding my cup, to stop it falling onto the deck, I raised it. When it was halfway to my mouth, a tremendous clamour of alarm bells, buzzers, and klaxons erupted, backed up by a large flashing red light, in case we were deaf! On the top right corner of the grey steel cabinet containing the display and audio electronics of the UA9 I was sitting in front of, another red light glowed balefully, to indicate which unit had the fire in it.

The coffee in my cup jumped up, and splashed over my leg. Nothing else moved for a moment, then; - "Shit!" My empty cup dropped to the deck as my right hand grabbed for the on/off power switch and snapped it to the off position. My left hand reached for the A.I. microphone, and pressed the tit in time for my voice to say; - "Fire, fire, fire! Fire in the Electronic Warfare Office!" As an afterthought, and most improperly, I added, "Not an exercise!"

I let go of the mike, stood, and reached up above the cabinet, where I threw over the levers which shut off the forced air cooling inlet and outlets for this particular cabinet, in theory preventing the fire from spreading. My voice then said, - "Shut that fucking bell off, Terry!" as I wrenched the CO2 fire extinguisher from its clips on the bulkhead, twisted off the plastic dispersal cone, and thrust the bare nozzle into a socket designed to receive it, before pulling the trigger, dumping the contents into the cabinet. I gave it a twenty second blast, which seemed like half an hour, barely aware of voices on the A.I. saying "Check, check, check! Cease firing. Break - EWO roger, sitrep when you can." And "Damage Control, roger. Teams on the way."

Faintly, from the tannoy in the passageway outside, another voice said; - "Fire, fire, fire. Fire in the E.W. Office. Not an exercise! Chief R.S. and Chief E.M. to the E.W. flat." (R.S. is Radio Supervisor, E.M. is Electronics Maintenance. The flat is the section of passageway containing the office).

Terry finally got the bell to shut up, and came back in from the adjacent compartment, where more of the circuitry was housed. "It won't reset, so I stuffed me mag into the clapper!"

Booted feet stampeded outside, then our tame electronics genius burst in. "What happened?" he gasped, worried about his 'baby', the UA9 which was sister to the UA8, two cabinets across, and separated by the UAZ, a simple (by modern standards) calculating machine. Each cabinet consisted of a frame supporting five drawers stuffed full of fragile glass valves, and other electronic bits and pieces. They needed constant nursing and cosseting to keep them happy.

I gave him a resume of what had happened, and what I saw and did.

"You didn't shut the whole thing down?"

"No. Just the one cabinet. I didn't think that you would appreciate having to restart, and then recalibrate, the whole thing, unless it's really buggered!"

"Good thinking!" He began cautiously feeling the faces of each of the drawers with the back of his hand, seeking an unusually hot one. (With a hundred or so valves in each drawer, they were ALL hot!).

Two burly stokers, the Damage Control advance party, lumbered in, lugging a one gallon gas/water extinguisher each, and stood gasping for breath. It is a long climb from the D.C. centre, up two decks, along half the length of the ship, then up another three decks.

"Ay, la'. Where's de fire?" One asked, in broad Scouse, as he looked around at the grey metal and glass faces of equipment that normally stayed hidden behind locked doors, and obviously meant nothing to him.

More feet pounded outside, then one of our two Radio Supervisors came in. He was tieless, his hair askew, feet bare inside his shoes, and his fly was still open. Seeing that the Tiffy had beaten him to the scene, he ignored the stokers, and

glanced around the office, noting what was where, then swore vitriolically, because he had been asleep in his 'pit'. Tiffy spoke to the D.C. lads. "I think the fire's out, you can go back to your cave, thanks."

"Yeah, ok." The two stokers slouched off, just as the rest of the party hauling hoses, nozzles, breathing gear, and all the paraphernalia of ship-borne fire-fighting, arrived.

Their P.O. (Petty Officer) asked what had happened. "I'm still checking, but we seem to have it in hand, thanks." Tiffy replied.

"Ok." The P.O. acknowledged. "About face, lads, back down below. Put the gear back where you got it from!" I unplugged the CO2 extinguisher from the cabinet socket, and tried to reattach the plastic cone, with no success. "Ah, ditch it!" Tiff said, "If there's any gas left in the bottle, point it at this drawer while I open it." I glanced at the gauge on the cylinder. "Ready." I aimed the nozzle at the indicated drawer. Gingerly, Tiff released the catches, then eased the drawer open an inch on its runners, allowing a thin wisp of grey smoke to escape.

"That's CO2." He said, then ran the drawer fully open, looking for signs of blackened components. "That one's ok." He worked round all the others, in turn, and found nothing.

"That's odd!" He slid the last drawer back into place, then switched the set on. "Let's see what happens. I hope the thermal shock hasn't cracked any valves."

"The air valves are still closed." I cautioned him.


