Sound Card Interface

I claim no originality for this project as I am sure many have gone down the same road before and like myself found suitable circuits in various publications or on the internet. Although my preferred mode of operation is Charlie Whisky I occasionally get the urge to look at other modes which, I might add, only confirm my belief that CW is preferable and more reliable regardless of the fact technology has moved forward at a rapid pace. Apart from that operators do not go into the "waffle mode".

When I first started to consider going digital, it was obvious an interface was essential and of course interfaces such as Signal Link and various other names were available, at a price, if you wanted something off the shelf. Not the answer for a true amateur. So were they really necessary? Surely there must be a simpler way?

Why do I need a separate sound card when there was a perfectly good one in my laptop? Why do I need to use a serial port to control the PTT? My laptop did not have one. Most schematics I found on the internet seemed to require it to control the PTT via the serial port.


All modern rigs have VOX so surely by using the audio generated from the computer sound card into the microphone socket would key the rig. All that would be needed would be to turn on the transceivers VOX feature and adjust the VOX gain and VOX delay controls.

As for signals received, a connection from the phone or extension speaker socket to the computer should be enough. Sounds easy but will it work? First I needed a program for the computer to work digi modes and there are quite a few freeware programs available, I downloaded DigiPan which is a fairly basic program. Making up a couple of leads I gave it a whirl and to my surprise it worked very well and a few PSK31 contacts were made.

The DigiPan program asks you for a serial port when setting up, as I was using VOX there was no need for one. I left the setting at none.

Although this worked well, in all my reading up on interfaces there was great stress on the need to isolate the computer and transceiver to prevent different voltage potentials and the risk of ground loop noise. To prevent damage to the computer or radio it would be advisable to insert isolating transformers on the TX and RX lines. You can pick up small 1:1 (600ohm) isolating transformers quite cheap on EBay. I paid $\pounds 1$ for a pair, I also obtained from the same source 5 Vero type strip boards for 99p, and all include postage; from China of course, how do they do it? Something else I found out during my research was these transformers work fine up to 1200 baud operations but do not have the correct frequency response for 9600 baud operations. Possible a piece of useless information if you are only thinking of PSK operations, as I was.


I settled for the following circuit which I built on a piece of strip board.



Being a very sensitive and easily offended person the sight of a twin adapter in the phone socket so that I could use it for both my phones and my new interface, as well as having something plugged in to the mike socket, my FT450D has never had a mike attached to it, it is still unwrapped in the box it came in, became a source of irritation. The interface had to go. Why did I want PSK31 anyway? Not being a trained touch typist meant using pre-set macros so after a few QSO's I lost interest.

My interest was rekindled at HMS Collingwood Open Day when as part of the team operating from the RNARS HQ shack, one of the members set up a SSTV station which seemed to go down well. So I thought, I would give that a whirl from home. Not keen to go back to my previous set up I did what all good amateurs do when all else fails; "Read the radio's instruction manual".

All modern radios of course have a digital socket at the rear of the rig but it meant resolving the problem of the PTT control. The VOX does not operate here. So back to the drawing board. In the past when radios did not have VOX as a standard those who wanted this facility it was usual to make up a VOX unit as a add on. None of my elderly radio manuals were of any help finding a solution to the problem so an appeal to a few of my amateur friends quickly produced a suitable circuit. The one I selected used an 8 pin dual op-amp type 1458 which I obtained for the princely sum of 35p at the Andover Rally. Later I discovered when looking up its specifications it was really two 741 op-amps in a handy parcel. Had I looked up the specs earlier I would have been 35p richer as I already had a couple of 741's in my junk box. You live and learn. If anyone has seen this circuit before you will see that some of the values of components used do vary from the original circuit but this is only because I used what resistors and capacitors I had to hand. They were near enough and the PTT operated successfully. Amateur radio rule two." Suck it and see". If it works, leave well alone. I can see the purists amongst you going red in the face and blood pressure rising at that statement.



I made several QSO's using the freeware program MMSSTV and received favourable reports on pictures sent. Flushed with success I decided, having noted that I could purchase a USB external sound card adapter

for $\pounds 1:97$, including post and packing, again from China, I could go the whole hog and produce a USB Sound Card Interface.

On receipt of the unit, which took about two weeks, I first plugged it into the computer to check it was working correctly and then with a fine knife split the case open to reveal its contents. It was then a simple matter to attach wires to the input and output sockets and feed them into Line-In and Line-Out sockets already built into the unit. This meant I had the choice of using either the computer sound card or using it as an independent unit. To also give it flexibility I fed all wires going to the computer into a socket at the back of the unit so that should I change or use another rig I could make up a suitable lead without having to open up the unit to swop leads.



The photos above and below show the completed unit. In true amateur style and using the kiss principle, I baulked at the idea of paying out for a die cast box so managed to scrounge an external twin socket box from a local electrician who was working close by, albeit it did cost me a mug of coffee and choccy biscuit, which I lined with bacon foil to complete the project. So for around £5 I had a unit that worked well and did all I required of it as opposed to paying some £80 for an all singing off the shelf unit.

At present he is also the Rally Coordinator, Area Manager, Historian and a Committee member all of which posts he is happy to retain. Chairman's Report

My final report as Chairman will be to give a summary of the past year's activities, some good, some sad: Not necessarily in that order.

Once again we have seen many of our members cross the bar. Their names and calls are now on the screen. In all we have 23 members who have crossed the bar but fortunately have 41 new members and re-joiners

so we remain solvent. As is the tradition of the service I would like you to stand 'if able' and join me in one minute's silence to mark our respect.

At the last AGM we were given the sad news that our patron Admiral Sir Peter Abbott had crossed the bar. We have been very fortunate that the First Sea Lord Sir Philip Jones accepted our request to become Patron' I am grateful to our President for his help in this matter'

When I first took over the chair membership was on the downward slope. I was determined to reverse this trend. Much work was put into reorganising and updating the society, publicity, extending membership qualifications to allow a wider range of maritime related individuals to apply. I have also on several occasions, done here and through the Newsletter, appealed to all members to recruit just one new member.

This has been received with great enthusiasm by the membership resulting in 0.05% of the membership responding. Our numbers have only managed to very slowly increase due the hard work of those who look after the stands at rallies and other activities as well as that of the committee. I think our shack manager, Nigel,MØNAF, holds the record with some fourteen new members to his credit.

We have had problems with D star and I am unimpressed with the support supplied by ICOM. They were approached with a request from us to train two of our HQ staff to maintain the equipment mainly the software....at our expense. This was turned down but they did offer what turned out to be, for various reasons an unsatisfactory alternative; I will leave Joe to inform you on this a little later. It is now back in operation after a very long down period.

Those of you who actually read the Newsletter will have read an article in the summer edition written by Bill G3TZM of the sterling efforts that the Marconi Amateur Radio Circle in Malta have put in to build from nothing a first-class radio HQ. They are affiliated to the RNARS and Bill is a regular visitor and supporter of the group. To complete their station we have supplied on permanent loan a suitable transceiver. I have on behalf of the RNARS also donated my spare transceiver to assist the Whale Island Sea Cadet Group for radio training. Collingwood Open Day was a big success this year not only because the weather was superb but due to Joe's efforts we had plenty of volunteers to man the shack. Operating conditions were not good but as we had a strong CW team many contacts were made. Twinkle fingers Mick of course made the most contacts. Some people may believe that sending Morse is old fashioned but it can always be relied on when other modes fail. Skype and the web notice board allowed many who could not work us on their preferred mode to get in touch. This year we also had SSTV in operation.

No ATV this year. We no longer house the ATV repeater as the ATV group made the decision earlier in the year that a higher site was needed for better coverage. Those who know this area will appreciate that being near sea level we are shielded to the North by a large barrier of chalk hills. I am not sure if the group are psychic or perhaps it was fortuitous that they had established a better site. A short time ago I received a "request" from the powers to be to establish what frequencies we were using. It would appear that with the many frequencies that are being used within the establishment some interference was affecting certain Service equipment which was operating mainly in the GHz range. They carried out a full and detailed inspection of the equipment in the shack confirming that our equipment was operating correctly and had no spurious emissions. Once they were happy that we only operated up to 430 MHz range we were given clearance. Shades of the old GPO knocking on the door to inspect your gear, hands up those who have had the dreaded knock.

We have had great success with those who taken their exams in the shack, which as I am sure you are aware is an official examination centre. This has also resulted in a few new members who are now frequent visitors which is good to see. We also have a few currently studying for the exam.

Sadly our very active and dedicated Shack Manager became seriously ill earlier in the year and his cheerful face has been greatly missed by all those who attend on a Tuesday afternoon. Manager's Reports – Maintenance Manager GØIEY

This year has been a busy one in the HQ Shack.

Those tools which were already available were sorted and a list compiled so that we knew what we had and any additional ones could be identified as being needed and purchased in order to carry out new and maintenance works around the shack.

The South Mast had essential works carried out to it. The North Mast following a survey. Essential works have been identified, which will involve stripping off all existing aerials and coaxial cables and replacing the steel cables for lowering and inspection of and possible replacement of the one for luffing the mast also.

The rotator fault was identified and will be rectified at the same time. It will be necessary to clean and paint the rotator housing at that time before refitting to the mast.

Existing aerials, clamps, etc., will be inspected and maintained/replaced as appropriate before refitting.

Replacing the coaxial cables for new ones on the North Mast will also impinge on those sections routed through the Shack and associated with it. The opportunity will therefore be taken to install the planned alterations and improvements to the operating positions in the shack on similar lines to the ones carried out in the work room. This will involve several trades, joinery, electrical and electronics. It is envisaged that this work in the main, would be carried out on a work bay at a time. It may be necessary to shut the shack for a period or periods to comply with safety requirements.

Work parties will be required to carry out these works as maintenance other than small running repairs are not allowed on the normal meeting day of Tuesday. As usual this will also be subject to our British weather.

On the traces of Cristóbal Colón A special visit to *La Rábida*

The monastery of Saint Mary of *La Rábida* (El monasterio de Santa María de *La Rábida*), generally only named "monastery of *La Rábida*" or just "*La Rábida*", situated in the near of Palos de la Frontera, was our destination for the day.

My daughter Karin had rented a car, the autumn weather was beautiful as we drove from Seville, my second home, on motorways in an excellent state, in the direction of *La Rábida*.

It was Sunday, 25 September 2016. The day at which my long- standing ambition would become reality: to visit *La Rábida*; an eighth birthday present from Karin.

The viewing of *La Rábida*: it was not only the absolute highlight of this day, but much more: it was an exceptional, an unforgettable day of my life.

The historical significance of La Rábida

The monastery *La Rábida* has an outstanding significance in connection with the realization of the first voyage of Colón in a westerly direction. Since a long time it was well-known in cultured circles, that the earth was a spherical shape. Because of that Colón was firmly convinced that, sailing in this direction, it must be possible to reach India.

In the year 1485 Colón came for the first time to this monastery and lived there some time. From the Franciscan monks he got scientific as well as intellectual help and support for his exceptional project. Key persons were the monks *Fray Antonio de Marchena* and *Fray Juan Pérez*. The last one arranged that Colón could meet the Spanish kings (*Isabel I de Castilla* and *Fernando II de Aragón*) to explain to them his plan. Furthermore enabled this monk that Colón could speak with the rich ship owner *Martín Pinzón*, an authoritative and influential personality both in Palos de la Frontera and the surrounding area.

That much in a few words to the fact on which nowadays the historical significance of *La Rábida* is based on. To view all the rooms in which the decisive talks of far-reaching significance were made, this was an unique and unforgettable experience for me.

The museum of the caravels (El museo de las carabelas)

This museum is in the near of *La Rábida*. One can see maps, sea charts, navigational instruments of that time, descriptions, photos and little models of the fleet of Colón for his first voyage of discovery.

In a stretch of standing water outside of the museum, especially built for this purpose, are scale replicas of *La Santa María*, *La Pinta* and *La Niña*.

They were built in connection with the world fair 1992 (Expo '92) in Seville and lay at anchor in the river *Guadalquivir* for public viewing. At that time I have been aboard of all three ships. But being here again aboard of them and look round without disturbing surroundings, without a milling crowd of visitors: to do this I would not miss! And it was also for my companions, Karin and Urs, an impressive experience. Seeing these three little ships in original size the only thing one can do is: with amazement admire that Colón has risked to carry out his voyage of discovery with them.

Thoughts about the events at that time...

Now I have viewed *La Rábida* and the museum of the caravels and have been, after many years, again aboard of these three ships.

How may it has been at that time before Colón could carry out his first voyage? It was a matter of course only that I asked myself about this and that corresponding thoughts arose.

I decided to inform myself after my return so far as possible with the corresponding literature of my library or, if deepening required, searching for other sources.

The following two chapters, deliberately briefly-worded, are the result of my investigations. I limited myself to mention the essentials only and not digress into detail of secondary importance.

The first voyage of Colón in the direction of "India"

After long-standing efforts Colón finally received in spring 1492 the approval and the support of the Spanish kings for his first voyage.

His little fleet were two caravels, *La Pinta* and *La Niña*, as well as a *nao* (ship of other design like that one of a caravel), *La Galleta*. He changed her name to *Santa María* and made it his flagship.

From the harbour of Palos de la Frontera started Colón with these three ships on 3 August 1492 his voyage in the westerly direction, firmly convinced to reach "India" on this way.

It was Friday 12 October 1492 (referred to the calendar at that time!) when Colón, after a voyage of lasting weeks, could step on to the "discovered" land: it was an island, named *Guanahaní* by the natives. For the Spanish kings he took possession of this island (based on which law?) and named it *San Salvador*. From his first voyage Colón returned to Palos de la Frontera on 15 March 1493 This first voyage of Colón in westerly direction was the action of a courageous man with extraordinary knowledge and abilities of navigation.

The result of this voyage?

The discovery of a "New World" had changed the world view, which at that time was strongly influenced by medieval thinking, not only fundamentally, but for ever.

Colón, the discoverer of "America"?

Colón has discovered "America"! This was taught to us in school. But this teaching is wrong and will not be true, even if it is repeated a thousand and one times!!! Colón discovered some islands in a sea region which nowadays is called "Caribbean". "Tierra firme", the mainland, that means a continent, he never found.

The following fact can be valued as definitive proof, that Colón never discovered "America", with other words, he could not discover it at all:

- In the year 1492 there doesn't exist a map of the world in which one a land with the name "America" was included.
- "India" was the land Colón was searching for and he was convinced that the islands discovered by him belong to India. These islands were in later years summarizing designated as "Las Indias".
- It has been the Italian seafarer and discoverer Amerigo Vespucci, who explored the east coast of today South America.
- > Colón died 20 May 1506 in Valladolid/Spain.

> 25 April 1507, roughly one year after the death of Colón, the German cartographer Martin Waldseemüller published his map of the world, in which for the first time for the southern part of this continent the name "America" was quoted. This was done to honour Amerigo Vespucci with the choice of his name for it.

Retrospective view

Again on the motorway, homewards in the direction of Seville, barren south andalucian landscape, occasional *fincas* (farmhouses) and plantations of olives. In the far distance, towering above the mass of houses, we could see *"La Giralda"*, the most famous landmark of Seville.

La Rábida, el museo de las carabelas, the replicas of the three ships of the fleet of Colón: only memories, memories of my day, of my very special and unforgettable day, which was on the one hand the present of my daughter Karin and on the other hand the day during that I had a lot of pleasant and unique experience...
